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Resolution 22: Approval of the SAIFC's Recommendation

- 3 *Abstract:* This resolution provides for the disbursement of \$8,000 to the Dilmun Hill Student
- 4 Farm in support of the construction of an outdoor learning area and the clarification of decisions
- 5 for the other two applications submitted to the Student Assembly Infrastructure Fund
- 6 Commission (SAIFC) by December 10th, 2024.

- 10 *Current Status:* Adopted by the Assembly, Unanimous Consent, 01/30/2025
- Whereas, the Student Assembly Infrastructure Fund Commission has received three applications for the 2024 Fall semester.
- 13 **Whereas**, the \$8,000 proposed allocation to Dilmun Hill Student Farm will fund the construction
- 14 of an outdoor learning area on the Cornell Ithaca campus.
- 15 Whereas, the Pi Delta Psi Multicultural Greek & Fraternal Council Renovation project is
- 16 proposed to be tabled indefinitely due to an eligibility concern.
- 17 Whereas, the decision for the Crosswalks on University Avenue project is proposed to be
- 18 postponed till the second hearing of the 2024-2025 funding cycle to collect more information
- 19 about alternative funding sources, such as the Ithaca-Tompkins County Transportation Council.
- 20 **Be it therefore resolved**, \$8,000 be transferred from the Infrastructure Fund Disbursement
- 21 Account to Dilmun Hill Student Farm for the construction of an outdoor learning area.
- 22 **Be it further resolved,** the Dilmun Hill Student Farm shall submit a report to the SAIFC no later
- than 6 months following the transfer of funds on how the allocated fund has been used, the
- expected time of project completion, and the latest person of contact. The report shall be
- 25 provided to the SAIFC Chair at the time, or the President of the Student Assembly should such
- 26 office be vacant.
- 27 **Be it finally resolved,** the resolution shall take effect upon approval of the Dean of Students.

SAIFC 2024 Fall Semester Report

34 Summary

The Student Assembly Infrastructure Fund Commission (SAIFC) is a committee under the 35 Student Assembly that has delegated authority to allocate the funds generated by the Student 36 Assembly Infrastructure Fund (SAIF). The primary objective of the SAIF is to provide financial 37 support for projects and initiatives that enhance infrastructure or facilities on campus, thereby 38 enriching the undergraduate experience at Cornell University. For the 2024-2025 funding cycle, 39 the commission comprises 15 voting members, including 7 community members and 8 assembly 40 representatives. As of this cycle, the commission has \$61,702.00 available for allocation, which 41 includes \$61,670 transferred from Funds From Endowment (FFE) and a carry-over of \$32.00 42 from the 2023-2024 funding cycle. 43 44 45 During the past semester, the commission focused on restructuring operations, publicizing funding opportunities, and reviewing funding applications. In total, 3 complete applications were 46 received: (1)Crosswalks on University Avenue, (2)Outdoor Learning Area at Dilmun Hill 47 48 Student Farm, and (3)Pi Delta Psi Multicultural Greek & Fraternal Council Renovation. The application of Pi Delta Psi Multicultural Greek & Fraternal Council Renovation was tabled 49 50 indefinitely due to eligibility concerns. The other two applications were advanced to hearing. On Dec 10th, 2024, the first hearing for the two applications ((1)Crosswalks on University Avenue 51 52 and (2)Outdoor Learning Area at Dilmun Hill Student Farm) took place. The commission finalized its decision on Dilmun Hill's application but postponed the decision for the Crosswalks 53 on University Avenue project to the spring semester of 2025. To date, \$8,000 (13% of available 54

- 55 funds) has been allocated, leaving \$53,670 (87% of available funds) available in the coming
- 56 semester.

91 Project Idea

- 92 Pi Delta Psi has a house on 124 Triphammer Rd in the North Campus that has held events for the
- greater Cornell community, such as BBQs, rush events, and more. However, the house has not
- had renovations for decades due to the lack of resources, resulting in safety concerns. Some areas
- that need renovation include chipped paint on the walls, a broken boiler, and broken roof tiles.
- 96 My project idea involves renovating areas in the house to ensure it meets necessary safety
- standards and becomes a more inclusive and functional space for hosting community events.
- 98 Renovations will include:



- 99 Painting interior walls to improve the atmosphere for gatherings.
- 100 Replacing water heater to allow for warm water to be used in the house.
- 101 Repairing holes in the concrete in the parking lot to eliminate potential safety hazards. -
- 102 Upgrading bathroom facilities and replacing damaged ceiling tiles to enhance safety and
- 103 hygiene. With the house renewed, we can further enable the house to serve as a safe space for the
- 104 Asian American community and a more welcoming venue for events hosted in collaboration
- 105 with student organizations. The renovated space will also expand our scope of events that can be
- 106 held, such as networking nights and cultural celebrations. <u>We have consulted our MGFC</u>
- 107 president, Cyan Crayon, and the Assistant VP of Student and Campus Life, Jenny Loeffelman,
- 108 <u>for support of our project.</u>
- 109

110 **Problem/Beneficiary**

- 111 The key issues are the deteriorating condition of the Pi Delta Psi house and the need to address
- safety hazards to meet Cornell's fire inspection and safety standards. Current problems include
- damaged walls, concrete hazards, and bathroom facilities that require updates to ensure the
- building is safe and accessible for all who use it. Without these renovations, the house's ability to
- 115 host events and meet university safety requirements is compromised.
- 116 The main beneficiaries include:
- 117 The broader Cornell community, as a safer and compliant building ensures the well-being of
- 118 everyone attending events.
- Asian American student organizations and other campus groups, which will gain access to a
- 120 functional and inviting venue for hosting cultural, educational, and community-building events.
- 121 Cornell students who attend events like rush events, cultural dances, and future events hosted in
- 122 the space, fostering inclusivity and cultural awareness.
- 123 Members and residents who live in the house.
- 124

125 Motivation

- 126 This project was motivated by the need to address both safety concerns and the broader lack of
- 127 institutional support that co-op and house-run residences like the Pi Delta Psi house often face
- 128 from Cornell. These types of houses play a critical role in fostering community engagement and
- 129 providing spaces for cultural, educational, and social events, yet they often lack the resources
- 130 and support needed to maintain safe and functional infrastructure. The current condition of the
- 131 house, including safety hazards and outdated facilities, limits its potential to serve as a venue for
- inclusive and culturally impactful events. By addressing these issues, the project seeks to not
- 133 only ensure compliance with safety standards but also to position the house as a resource for the
- 134 broader Cornell community while promoting cultural exchange, inclusivity, and community
- 135 building.

139Commission Decision

- 140 The application was tabled indefinitely by a simple majority vote during the regular commission
- 141 meeting on Nov 26th, 2024.
- 142

143 **Rationale**

- 144 The project involves renovating a fraternity house, which is Cornell housing with a designated
- funding system. Typically, such housing is expected to rely on the rent collected from residents and funding from its parent organizations to sustain daily operations.
- 147
- 148 In the 2023-2024 funding cycle, a similar application was submitted by the Triphammer Co-op
- 149 for house renovations. While this application was initially approved by the commission and the
- 150 general Student Assembly, it was later rejected by the school administration before any fund



- 151 transfers were made. The administration's feedback indicated that co-op housing, designed to
- 152 operate within its own financial ecosystem, should minimize reliance on external funding
- sources. Instead, financial challenges should be addressed through measures such as rent
- adjustments, expense management, and structural reforms to the housing's financial model.
- 155
- 156 Given the parallels between the Triphammer Co-op application and the Pi Delta Psi project, the
- 157 commission anticipated a high likelihood of rejection from the administration, even if the Pi
- 158 Delta Psi proposal was approved by the commission and the Student Assembly. Therefore, the
- 159 commission decided to table the application indefinitely.
- 160
- 161 However, the commission recognizes the risks that inadequate infrastructure poses to the health
- and quality of life of residents. Additionally, these housing facilities have the potential to serve
- 163 as valuable community hubs for broader Cornell groups. Similar concerns have also been raised
- by other co-ops. As a result, the commission recommends addressing these systemic issues in
- 165 collaboration with the administration and relevant offices to reform the financial structures of
- such housing and identify immediate solutions for the identified problems. The commission calls
- 167 for the general assembly to participate in this process.

173 **Project Idea**

- 174 This project aims to increase pedestrian safety by implementing a new crosswalk and crosswalk
- sign across University Ave at the intersection of McGraw Place, University Ave, and West Ave.
- 176 This project would make undergraduate students feel more safe commuting to and from class.
- 177 According to the campus planning office, an informal rough estimate for paint on the ground and
- two yield signs is \$3000.
- 179

180 **Problem/Beneficiary**

- 181 Drivers often speed on University Ave, and I have witnessed at least 3 incidents of roadkill this
- 182 semester alone not far from the proposed location of the crosswalk. This location is ideal as there
- is a lot of foot traffic across the road at this point. On the McGraw side, there are multiple living
- 184 complexes, fraternities, and Watermargin coop that house undergraduate students who would
- 185 cross the road at this point daily to get to class. On the West Ave side, there lies a path that



186	directs one from the bottom of the slope to the heart of campus, as well as West Campus, a
187	highly concentrated area of undergraduate residents as well. As the road curves above the
188	proposed location, pedestrians have limited time to assess safety before crossing the road, and
189	drivers have limited time to react. If students have any impediments that may cause them to cross
190	the road at a slower pace, or a driver is not paying close attention, there is an unnecessarily high
191	risk of an incident. The main beneficiaries would be students residing on and just North of West
192	Campus, though all undergraduate students would likely benefit as this part of campus is well
193	trafficked for various reasons, and is on campus at an 'exit corner' where students living further
194	in the west direction would likely use fairly often. The feasibility of the idea was backed by
195	David Cutter from the Campus Planning Office.
196	
197	Motivation
198	This idea was brought to my attention by members of my house as they cross the road at this
199	point every day to get to class! As a driver and pedestrian, I have experienced worry in this area
200	that I think could be successfully and easily mitigated.
201	
202	Updated Information During Hearing
203	The information below is from the presentation by Zada Stuart on Dec 10th, 2024.
204	This central area on University Ave at the North Westernmost corner of the Slope (points C and
205	A) is heavily trafficked by undergraduate students.
206	
207	Effected Daily:
208	• Off-campus, Cornell-affiliated student living options (Watermargin Co-op, fraternities)**
209	• Off-campus, non-affiliated, predominantly student housing (Campus Hill Apartments)**
210	Cornell Food Pantry
211	Cornell Center for Historical Keyboards
212	**Students on West commuting to North Campus
213	
214	Demonstrated need during slope day with crossing guard at the described location. High
215	speeding on University Ave, frequently seems to be over the campus speed limit of 20mph + at
216	least 4 instances of road kill this semester.
217	
218	The project's latest proposal is for 4 crosswalks to be added at locations of red dashes and
219	alphabet characters. The priority is descending from A to D.

224 Decision of Commission

The decision for this project funding was postponed to the next hearing in the spring semester of 2025 by a simple majority yota during the first hearing on Dec 10th 2024

226 2025 by a simple majority vote during the first hearing on Dec 10th, 2024.

227228 Rationale

229 The Campus Planning Office has reviewed the proposed project and indicated that the university

plans to reconstruct a section of West Avenue near Baker Flagpole within approximately five

- 231 years. This reconstruction includes considerations for improving crosswalks on the avenue. If
- students wish to implement temporary crosswalk markings promptly to mitigate safety risks, the
- 233 proposed project could deliver immediate benefits. However, due to the location of the
- crosswalks on University Avenue, approval from the city's transportation department is still
- 235 required for the installation of yield signs and crosswalk markings.



236

- 237 The commission acknowledges the critical need for enhanced crosswalk safety, particularly at
- 238 locations A and C, to better protect pedestrians. The project is low-cost, straightforward to
- execute, and has the potential to significantly improve student safety and quality of life. For the
- 240 commission to approve the other two crosswalk locations, stronger evidence of support from the
- broader undergraduate community, beyond residents of nearby housing, would be beneficial.
- 242
- Additionally, there may be funding opportunities available through the City of Ithaca or other
- 244 local government departments that could support the project without relying solely on SAIF
- funds. The commission encourages the applicant to work with the local transportation
- 246 department and Campus Planning Office to assess alternative funding sources and whether the
- 247 use of SAIF could accelerate the project's implementation.
- 248
- Given these considerations, the decision on this project has been postponed to the next hearing,
- 250 scheduled for late March 2025. This timeline is subject to changes in the SAIF spring application
- timeline. The chair may call an additional hearing before this date if the majority of the
- commission agrees to bring up the decision time for the project.

- 258 **Project Idea**

259 Outdoor Learning Area at Dilmun Hill Student Farm

260 We propose to create an outdoor learning area at Dilmun Hill Student Farm, located at

261 705 Dryden Road, near the pollinator garden on the farm. This space will be designed to support

262 interactive and practical education for a diverse range of users, including visiting classes, Dilmun

- 263 Hill community members, and participants in educational workshops. The attached document
- ²⁶⁴ "Dilmun Tour and Outreach Log.xlsx" has a list of the classes and workshops that Dilmun has
- ²⁶⁵ hosted in the past 2 years. The space will feature four picnic tables arranged to facilitate group
- learning and discussions, as well as a whiteboard for presentations and hands-on instruction. A
- 267 large shade canopy will provide protection from the sun. These additions will enhance the
- 268 functionality of the farm as a teaching and learning space by providing a designated area for
- 269 structured activities while allowing students and educators to connect with the natural
- 270 environment. The location near the pollinator garden offers opportunities to integrate lessons on



- agriculture, ecology, and environmental science across disciplines and colleges. This project will
- significantly impact undergraduate students by creating a unique venue for experiential learning,
- 273 fostering collaboration, and deepening their engagement with sustainable food systems and
- environmental stewardship. The project idea is backed by CALS staff and has been
- 275 communicated with the Campus Planning Office.

276

277 **Problem/Beneficiary**

- 278 The problem we aim to address is the lack of formal learning space at Dilmun Hill Student Farm.
- 279 Currently, visiting classes and workshops often have no choice but to sit on the ground, which
- 280 can be uncomfortable and limits the accessibility of the space for individuals who require seating
- accommodations. Additionally, there is limited shade at the farm as the only available structure
- is a barn used for the storage of farm equipment and produce. By creating a shaded outdoor
- learning area with picnic tables and a whiteboard, we will provide a more inclusive and
- functional environment for education. The main beneficiaries of this project include
- undergraduate students, who will gain access to a dedicated space for hands-on and collaborative
- learning, as well as community members and workshop participants who will benefit from a
- 287 more accessible and inviting environment. This project enhances equity and ensures that all
- visitors can fully participate in the farm's educational offerings.
- 289

290 Motivation

- 291 This idea was inspired by other university student farms that serve as both productive
- agricultural spaces and dynamic learning environments. Observing their success highlighted the
- 293 potential for Dilmun Hill Student Farm to expand its role as an educational hub. Currently, the
- 294 farm lacks sufficient infrastructure to accommodate the growing number of students and
- 295 community members who visit for classes, workshops, and events. We envision this outdoor
- learning area as the first step in creating a more functional and inclusive space for experiential
- 297 education. Our long-term goal is to continue building on this project, eventually developing
- additional outdoor learning spaces and, potentially, an outdoor amphitheater. These
- 299 enhancements will further transform Dilmun Hill into a central location for environmental and
- 300 agricultural education, fostering engagement and collaboration.

308 Hundreds of visitors come to the farm every year. In the fall semester of 2024 only, there are

309 700+ visits. Most visits happen during the fall and summer, making use of the outdoor education

310 space. The only existing building on the farm is the barn for equipment right now, which only

311 workers on the farm can enter, so no public events can be hosted there. Typically, visitors need

to sit outdoors in the sun and rain depending on the weather.

313

314 The hip shade chosen may not be able to shelter people from rain as the canvas is permeable to

315 water. For maintenance purposes, the shading canvas will need to be taken down to prevent

damage from winter weather. The reason that the farm would like to have a permanent

installation is to reduce the need for labor, particularly for summer when only 2 student

318 managers are around.

322 **Decision of Commission**

The application was approved with an \$8,000 (13% of available funds) funding allocation with a simple majority vote during the first hearing on Dec 10th, 2024.

325

326 Rationale

327 The commission decided not to approve the full funding request as submitted, recognizing

- 328 opportunities to use the budget more efficiently. Cost savings can be achieved by exploring less
- 329 expensive alternatives. For example, while recycled materials are commendable, the non-
- 330 recycled, more affordable options or secondhand options can provide equivalent functionality.
- 331 The commission recommends the organization consider sourcing items such as whiteboards and
- 332 other supplies from platforms like Amazon and Walmart.
- 333
- Additionally, reevaluating temporary but mobile event tents could satisfy the project's needs
- more effectively. The justification for the high-cost hip shade was deemed insufficient. The
- 336 chosen hip shade with its permeable canvas does not offer significant functional advantages over
- mobile event tents, particularly as both require similar labor for setup and takedown.
- 338 Furthermore, the farm's summer operations primarily serve the off-campus community, which is
- not a main consideration for SAIF.
- 340
- 341 As a result, the commission approved only a portion of the requested budget to better align with 342 these considerations.
