

Resolution 22: Supporting Cooperative Housing

- 3 Abstract: This resolution calls on the Cornell Housing Office to better advertise Cooperative
- 4 housing as an alternative to traditional on- or off-campus housing, particularly because the
- 5 application process begins February 12th.

- Whereas, Cooperative housing at Cornell is a cheaper alternative to the traditional Cornell
- housing experience. Co-ops are unique, collaborative communities governed by student
- 14 residents;

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- 15 Whereas, Co-ops are significantly cheaper than both on- and off-campus housing options and
- four have meal plans that are significantly less expensive than the Cornell alternative;
- Whereas, Co-ops foster a sense of community and belonging, particularly for marginalized
- 18 groups and communities at Cornell;
- 19 Whereas, Wari Cooperative was founded in 1968 as a safe space for Black women on campus;
- 20 Whereas, Lodge Cooperative is centered on low-income BIPOC students on campus;
- 21 Whereas, Watermargin Cooperative was founded following World War II as an interracial,
- 22 inter-religious living space and continues to center marginalized peoples;
- Whereas, the Cornell Housing Office does not advertise cooperatives as much as they advertise
- 24 dorms for underclassmen and off-campus housing for upperclassmen;
- Whereas, Lodge Cooperative is not advertised by the Cornell Housing Office at all because they
- are tenant-owned instead of Cornell-owned;
- Whereas, the mosey process to apply for house membership begins on Sunday, February 12th
- with an open house at all co-ops participating in mosey (Triphammer, Prospect of Whitby, 302
- 29 Wait, 308 Wait, Watermargin, Redbud, 660 Stewart, and Lodge Cooperative);
