S.A. Resolution #28 1 2 Mandating Cornell's Commitment to the Economic Justice of Puerto Rico and the Operational Transparency of its Investments 3 4 5 ABSTRACT: This resolution recommends that Cornell University investigate its holdings and divest 6 from any and all Puerto Rican debt obligations. Additionally, Cornell should create a fair investment 7 policy in regard to government debt as well as disclose its investment partnerships in yearly tax filings. 8 9 Sponsored by: Zachary Schmetterer '18 10 11 Whereas, a letter signed by 28 organizations was sent to President Pollack on October 16, 2017 regarding 12 the university's endowment holdings in Seth Klarman's Baupost Group, which owns \$911.6 million worth 13 of Puerto Rican debt bonds: 14 15 Whereas, in said letter, Hedge Clippers and its partner organizations outlined the adverse economic 16 impacts of lobbying done on the behalf of Baupost and other fund managers to the economic wellbeing 17 and recovery of Puerto Rico; 18 19 Whereas, the Intercept and CNBC found that Baupost purchased \$469 million senior and \$442 junior 20 COFINA bonds through shell company Decagon Holdings LLC to shield the hedge fund from public 21 scrutiny; 22 23 Whereas, Cornell University has not publicly disclosed its holdings in the Baupost Group, and the Office 24 of the University Treasurer "is bound by confidentiality agreements with its investment managers that 25 prevent Cornell from publicly disclosing a manager's investment strategy or investment holdings" as of 26 December 22, 2017; 27 28 Whereas, the University Tax Office fails to disclose any of Cornell's investment partnerships relating to 29 "investment income information provided by the endowment's investment managers" on its Form 990 30 and Form 990-T; 31 32 Whereas, Cornell's disclosure policies represent a significant departure from that of peer institutions such 33 as Harvard, Yale, and Princeton; for instance, Princeton's 2015 Form 990 clearly lists the University's 34 partnerships and investments in funds managed by the Baupost Group; 35 36 Whereas, Cornell has previously shown its commitment to the welfare of Puerto Rico and its people with 37 its offer of a free semester of study to 62 students from Universidad de Puerto Rico; 38 39 Be it therefore resolved, that Cornell University makes a strong commitment to economic justice and

Be it further resolved, that Cornell University conduct a due diligence investigation of its holdings with

the Baupost Group and divest from any and all Puerto Rican debt obligations;

operational transparency as well as execute the following remedies;
