2 Approval of the 2019-2020 Standing Rules

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4 ABSTRACT: The Student Assembly Bylaws state that the first meeting of the academic year must
5 be to approve the Standing Rules. This resolution proposes changes to the Standing Rules for the
6 Fall 2019 Assembly session.

11 academic year shall be known as the Organizational Meeting and shall be for the purpose of
12 adopting the schedule for regular meeting and approving the standing rules;”

14 **Whereas**, the Student Assembly President, the Executive Vice President, and the Parliamentarian
15 are charged with the responsibility of these Standing rules revision at the beginning of each
16 semester;

18 **Be it therefore resolved**, that the Student Assembly approve and adopt the attached Standing Rules
19 for the Fall 2019 Session of the 2019-2020 Academic Year.

1 **Standing Rules**
2 **Cornell University Student Assembly**
3 *For 2019-2020*

4 **Section 1: Preamble**

- 5 A. The Student Assembly's foremost interest in 2019-2020 shall be the undergraduate students of Cornell
6 University. These Standing Rules shall serve as guidelines for specific rules and effective leadership from the
7 Student Assembly that may not specifically be covered in the charter or bylaws, but will aid in the efficiency
8 of a successful Assembly. These Standing Rules shall be adhered to by all Student Assembly members (elected
9 and ex-officio), committee members, community members, and staff.
- 10 B. These Standing Rules shall be utilized with the following prefaces:
- 11 i. Rule 1: In the event of a conflict, the Charter, Bylaws, and Special Rules of Order shall supersede the
12 Standing Rules.
- 13 ii. Rule 2: The Standing Rules shall be revised at the beginning of each semester by the President, the
14 Executive Vice-President, and the Parliamentarian and submitted by the Executive Vice President and
15 Parliamentarian to the Student Assembly for approval. The Standing Rules shall take effect upon a
16 majority vote of approval by the voting membership of the Student Assembly. The Standing Rules can
17 also be edited at any time by a majority vote of the membership of the SA.
- 18 iii. Rule 3: A motion to suspend the Standing Rules must be recognized by the Chair and approved by a two-
19 thirds vote of Student Assembly members present.

20 **Section 2: Ethical Standards and Attendance Policy**

- 21 A. Ethical Conduct is expected of all members at all times, as members are representative of their constituencies.
22 Any member found to be using the name of the SA outside of the bounds of the individual's described role
23 on the SA, abusing the SA brand to acquire additional benefits or privileges, or any such similar matter shall
24 be in violation of this ethics clause. The appropriate disciplinary action shall be determined by the Executive
25 Board, the Dean of Students, and the Office of Assemblies.
- 26 B. The Student Assembly is charged to "seek out and voice effectively the interests and concerns of the student
27 body." To do this, attendance and participation, as outlined below is imperative for efficiency within the
28 Assembly:
- 29 i. Rule 1: Attendance is required at all regularly scheduled meetings for all voting and ex-officio
30 members who serve in a liaison capacity. Absences will not be recorded for ex-officio
31 organizational liaison members, i.e. Tri-Council and Residential Student Congress, if the absence
32 is a result of a conflicting obligation related to their respective organization. Attendance
33 requirements for all operational ex-officio members shall be at the discretion of the executive
34 committee. Absences for shared government liaisons will not be under the discretion of the
35 executive committee. Regularly scheduled meetings are held Thursdays, from 4:45 until 6:30
36 p.m., while undergraduate colleges are in session. Informal meetings are considered official
37 meetings when held in lieu of regular Thursday meetings or when deemed official by a
38 unanimous vote of the executive committee.
- 39 ii. Rule 2: Attendance at all organizational and specially-scheduled meetings is required, when the
40 Executive Committee provides SA members at least 24 ~~72~~ hours' prior notice of the meeting.
41 Such meetings shall be considered "regularly scheduled meetings," for the purpose of accruing

- 42 absences. Ex-officio members will be excused from these meetings unless notified otherwise by
43 the Executive Committee.
- 44 iii. Rule 3: All voting members must remain an active member of at least one committee as per the
45 standards established by the chair of their respective committee. Failure to remain an active
46 member of at least one committee can result in vacancy of a seat at the discretion of the
47 Executive Committee.
- 48 iv. Rule 4: Any member who fails to attend a required meeting or event shall be considered absent.
49 Any late arrival beyond the first 15 minutes of the meeting will result in a half-absence **if there is**
50 **no notification at least 24 hours in advance to the Vice President of Internal Operations.** Any
51 early departure will result in a half-absence **if there is no notification at least 24 hours in advance**
52 **to the Vice President of Internal operations.** The Executive Committee reserves the right to
53 decide what constitutes an early departure.
- 54 v. Rule 5: Any member who arrives late to a required meeting or event but within the first 15
55 minutes after Roll-Call will receive a quarter-absence.
- 56 vi. Rule 6: At the discretion of the Vice President of Internal Operations, unavoidable academic
57 conflicts including prelims, final presentations, and field trips but not including office hours,
58 review sessions or professor visits that are in direct conflict with a required Student Assembly
59 meeting will not be counted towards the three cumulative regularly scheduled meetings if they
60 are reported **at least 24 hours ~~2-weeks~~** before the meeting conflict. Academic conflicts that
61 cannot be reasonably predicted **at least 24 hours ~~2-weeks~~** before the meeting conflict can be
62 excused by a majority vote of the executive committee.
- 63 vii. Rule 7: At the discretion of the Vice President of Internal Operations, unavoidable conflicts as a
64 result of job interviews and scholarship interviews that are in direct conflict with a required
65 Student Assembly meeting will not be counted towards the three cumulative regularly scheduled
66 meetings if they are reported as soon as the conflict arises.
- 67 viii. Rule 8: At the discretion of the Vice President of Internal Operations, unavoidable conflicts as a
68 result of religious obligations that are in direct conflict with a required Student Assembly meeting
69 will not be counted towards the three cumulative regularly scheduled meetings if they are
70 reported **at least 24 hours ~~3-weeks~~** before the meeting conflict.
- 71 ix. Rule 9: The Vice President of Internal Operations can request documentation for proof of
72 absence.
- 73 x. Rule 10: Any college or constituency who lacks representation as a result of a seat being vacated
74 or unclaimed shall be filled by the runner-up in the most recent election for that seat. If the seat
75 remains vacant, an interim representative shall be appointed by the President, and confirmed by
76 a majority of SA Members. The interim representative shall have full voting privileges associated
77 with membership on the SA. The interim representative post shall be terminated immediately
78 upon the declaration of a permanent replacement via an election. The interim position will
79 remain in effect for the remainder of semester if the position becomes vacant following the first
80 3 weeks of the semester.
- 81 xi. Rule 11: All candidates who are elected to the Student Assembly during Spring Elections are
82 required to attend all Organizational Meetings and the last two SA meetings during the Spring
83 Semester. Absences at these meetings will count toward the member's term total.
- 84 xii. Rule 12: All elected members of the Student Assembly will adhere to the Cornell University
85 Student Assembly Oath of Office, which states:

86 *In the view of the trust the Cornell Community has vested in me, as well as my personal sense of honor, I _____,*
87 *do solemnly affirm to fulfill my responsibilities as a student-elected representative. I will engage in open and honest debate in*
88 *a process where I am guided by truth and fairness. I will never purposely misrepresent facts in an effort to achieve my goals. If*
89 *a conflict of interest arises, I will relinquish my right to participate in the decision making process. I will seek out and voice*



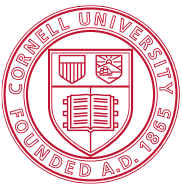

90 *effectively the interests and concerns of the student body, address the issues of my fellow students, and strive to improve the*
91 *quality of life at Cornell for all students.*

92 **Section 3: Agenda-Setting Policies and Procedures**

- 93 A. Rule 1: The agenda for any informal meetings shall not contain voting on legislation unless these meetings are
94 held in lieu of regular Thursday meetings or to meet a deadline.
- 95 B. Rule 2: The Executive Vice President will place under Business of the Day any item that has been previously
96 discussed. Additionally, appropriation requests and committee assignments are to appear under Business of
97 the Day. All other items shall be introduced as New Business, unless otherwise authorized by a majority vote
98 of the Executive Board or a majority vote of the Student Assembly.
- 99 C. Rule 3: New Business shall be an opportunity for SA and community members to ask questions of and make
100 suggestions to the author of a piece of legislation. Comments may not be argumentative in nature and
101 questions must seek factual answers.
- 102 D. Rule 4 Business of the Day shall be an opportunity for discussion and debate on the legislation.
- 103 E. Rule 5: Prior to introduction as New Business, all resolutions shall be reviewed and approved by an
104 appropriate SA committee no more than 30 days before the EVP sends the agenda to the general public. The
105 Executive Vice President or the Vice President of Internal Operations will determine which committee will
106 review a resolution. A resolution cannot be introduced to the SA without approval by an appropriate SA
107 committee except under extenuating circumstances in which the Executive Board determines that a
108 resolution should be brought to the floor without a committee review. Approval by a committee requires a
109 majority vote of the committee members present at the committee meeting. A representative of the
110 committee that reviewed the resolution is permitted to give a brief summary of the committee's thoughts or
111 concerns on the resolution when it is presented a regularly scheduled Student Assembly meeting.
- 112 F. Rule 6. In order for a resolution to be moved to Business of the Day, a Resolution must have been discussed
113 at a prior meeting or be moved to Business of the Day by a $\frac{2}{3}$ vote of members present.
- 114 G. Rule 7: If the Residential Student Congress needs to pass a formal legislative resolution concerning residential
115 life at Cornell, the Residential Student Congress has the authority to pass resolutions that will be introduced
116 as New Business on the Student Assembly agenda. These resolutions must explicitly pertain to residential life.
117 Any resolutions presented by the Residential Student Congress must have been voted on and approved by a
118 majority vote of the general body members of the Residential Student Congress and the Residential Student
119 Congress liaison to the Student Assembly, who must be the sponsor of the resolution. The resolution must
120 be sent to the Student Assembly EVP at least one week before the Student Assembly meeting where the
121 resolution will appear on the agenda. All resolutions appearing on the SA agenda through this method,
122 without having been passed by an SA committee, will require a vote of two-thirds of SA members present to
123 be passed.
- 124 H. Rule 8: At its weekly meeting, the Executive Committee will discuss the agenda for Student Assembly
125 meetings. Items for the agenda must be submitted to the Executive Vice President of the Student Assembly
126 in the proper format, as designated by the Executive Vice President.
- 127 I. Rule 9: The Office of the Assemblies must post the agenda to the Student Assembly website no later than
128 noon on the day of the meeting.
- 129 J. Rule 10: The Vice President of External Affairs and the sponsors of the resolution must ensure that all
130 parties, including but not limited to any specific Cornell student, administrator, faculty member, or staff
131 member, involved or impacted by particular legislative actions are notified and invited to attend the meeting
132 at which the action shall be heard. Additionally, any registered student organization must be notified if the
133 proposed legislation affects their funding or guidelines. The aforementioned need not consent to the
134 legislation, but it is highly encouraged that the aforementioned attend the meeting. In the event that the

- 135 author of said legislation is uncomfortable contacting all interested parties, they may request that the Vice
136 President of External Affairs does so on their behalf.
- 137 K. Rule 11: A short descriptive abstract of approximately 25 words will be submitted by sponsors of resolutions
138 before committee approval.
- 139 L. Rule 12: Student Assembly Initiatives should be presented as reports to the Student Assembly with an
140 opportunity for questions from Student Assembly Members and Community Members. A summary of
141 the initiative reports will be reported over the Actions Listserv bi-weekly. The following procedures will
142 be followed for initiative reports:
- 143 i. The Chair announces the initiative and the sponsors have two minutes to present their initiative
 - 144 ii. A moderated Q&A will follow the presentation, the questions can be argumentative in nature as
145 Student Assembly Representatives and community members shall be empowered to express their
146 approval or disapproval
 - 147 iii. The Chair shall be empowered to determine to end the time when the allocated time has expired,
148 conversation has become redundant, or the speaker's list has been exhausted
 - 149 iv. The Executive Vice President shall be empowered to make the determination as to what will be
150 presented as an initiative
- 151 M. Rule 13: Following the Referenda protocol in Article III §8 of the Student Assembly Charter, the Executive
152 Vice President will present an update on pro and con statements during the Promotional Period. The
153 Executive Vice President will give this presentation at the first regularly scheduled SA meeting after the
154 Office of the Assemblies posts the community statements anonymously to the Assemblies website.
- 155 N. Rule 14: Every voting member of the Student Assembly shall submit their weekly report for the previous
156 week to the Executive Vice President at least 72 hours in advance of the next regularly scheduled meeting to
157 be included with the meeting minutes for the previous Student Assembly meeting. Failure to provide a bi-
158 weekly report will result in a quarter absence unless the representative provided a reasonable excuse to the
159 Executive Vice President.

160 Section 4: Abstentions and Proxy Voting

- 161 A. Rule 1: As per the Cornell University Student Assembly Oath of Office, members shall abstain from voting if
162 a conflict of interest arises.
- 163 B. Rule 2: SA members may abstain from voting at regularly scheduled or special meetings of the Assembly.
164 However, if the total number of abstentions is greater than the total number of votes in favor of a resolution
165 or motion, the resolution or motion fails.
- 166 C. Rule 3: The tendering of proxy votes shall occur in accordance with the Special Rules or Order, but shall
167 require that an excused absence be noted by the Vice President of Internal Operations.
- 168 D. Rule 4: All members of the Appropriations Committee and the Student Assembly shall abstain from voting if
169 they have a conflict of interest. A member shall be deemed to have a conflict of interest if they hold an
170 executive board position in the organization. Additionally, a member shall be considered to have a conflict of
171 interest if they have requested funding or financial co-sponsorship from the organization in the previous 3
172 months or intend to request in the next 3 months.
- 173 E. Rule 5: The previous rule shall not apply to the Student Assembly's determination of the Student Assembly's
174 Byline Funding Allocation; however, all representatives shall hold the Student Assembly to the same or higher
175 standards as all other applicants.

176 Section 5: Committee Leadership and Oversight

- 177 A. The committees of the Student Assembly are essential to the functioning of the shared governance system.
178 Leaders of the Assembly committees are elected to effectively run the Assembly. As a result, members in
179 such a position are charged with these obligations and are required to adhere by as such:
- 180 i. Rule 1: In accordance with Rules 5–8 and Articles 3 and 7 of the Student Assembly Charter, the SA Vice
181 President of Internal Operations has the obligation to be in constant contact with the SA clerk, all
182 committee chairs, and all bodies in which the SA sends representation to keep an accurate log of
183 attendance. The SA Vice President of Internal Operations shall report any pressing matters regarding
184 attendance, such as members in jeopardy of exceeding the allowed number of absences, to the Executive
185 Committee at their weekly meeting.
 - 186 ii. Rule 2: Each SA member must be a voting member of at least one SA committee, the University
187 Assembly, or a UA committee. The Chair of each committee shall inform the SA VP of Internal
188 Operations of any SA members who are in jeopardy of violating the committee's attendance policy.
189 Additionally, the committee chair shall inform the VP of Internal Operations if an SA member has
190 violated the committee's attendance policy and has been removed from the committee.
 - 191 iii. Rule 3: The President, Executive Vice President, and Vice President of Internal Operations will be ex-
192 officio members of every committee, except the Elections Committee, and taskforce associated with the
193 Student Assembly and whose activities are delineated in the SA charter.
 - 194 iv. Rule 4: Committee chairs will report updates as necessary regarding upcoming committee meeting dates
195 and times at regularly scheduled meetings, as well as post committee agendas and minutes to the SA
196 website, as appropriate.
 - 197 v. Rule 5: All SA Committee members must be a member of their respective committee listservs. Meeting
198 dates, times, and agendas shall be sent to all committee members 24 hours prior to the meeting via the
199 appropriate committee listserv. By a two-thirds vote of committee members present, the committee may
200 amend their agenda.
 - 201 vi. Rule 6: Each committee chair is responsible for reaching out to relevant student organizations in order to
202 solicit feedback on ideas and collaborate with student groups on initiatives that the committee is working
203 on.

204 Section 6: General Meeting Procedures

- 205 B. To “voice effectively” these interests which were mentioned above, strict rules must be adhered to when
206 conducting business as an assembly. These rules focus on the efficiency and organization of the tasks at hand:
- 207 i. Rule 1: Speakers will be recognized at the discretion of the Chair and placed on a speaker’s list
208 maintained by the Chair. Each speaker shall have a maximum of two minutes to speak, with the option to
209 yield the balance of his, her, or their time to another single individual at the meeting, including the Chair.
210 It is at the Chair’s discretion to place additional limitations on speaking time.
 - 211 ii. Rule 2: All speakers shall address their remarks to the Chair.
 - 212 iii. Rule 3: The Chair shall keep time at any point when such is required.
 - 213 iv. Rule 4: Except for points of order, information, and questions of privilege, no person shall be recognized
214 by the Chair twice before all other members (voting, community, and ex-officio) have had the
215 opportunity to speak.
 - 216 v. Rule 5: The Chair will recognize the members of the community who wish to speak on the question. The
217 Chair will have discretion as to when community members are recognized. Each speaker will limit his,
218 her, or their comments to no more than two minutes. If multiple speakers wish to address the Student
219 Assembly, equal opportunity will be given to those in favor of and those opposed to the question, in such
220 order, to speak.
 - 221 vi. Rule 6: The Chair may call the question, without it requiring a second or vote, when he or she deems that
222 debate has exceeded its time limit or when discussion becomes repetitive.

- 223 vii. Rule 7: When the vote of the Chair may decide the outcome of a decision (i.e. to make or break a tie), he
224 or she shall be empowered to cast a vote, but shall do so only after all other voting members of the
225 Student Assembly have registered their votes.
226 viii. Rule 8: A voting Student Assembly member may appeal the decision of the Chair when he or she
227 disagrees with the Chair's interpretation or application of the Standing Rules, Bylaws, or the Charter. The
228 motion shall require a simple majority to pass.
229 ix. Rule 9: Any voting SA member may attempt to overrule a decision by the Executive Committee by
230 submitting their challenge in the format of a resolution at the next regularly scheduled meeting. A 2/3
231 majority of the voting membership must be reached to overrule the Executive Committee at any time.
232 x. Rule 10: The Parliamentarian shall administer a short examination on parliamentary procedure to all
233 voting members of the SA within four meetings of a representative taking the oath of office. This
234 examination will cover content from Robert's Rules of Order and the most recent version of the SA
235 Charter, Bylaws, and Standing Rules. Any member who does not pass (a grade of 70% or higher) will be
236 required to attend an additional review workshop and retake the exam.
237 xi. Rule 11: Student Assembly members shall be permitted to withdraw a motion after it has been seconded
238 and before a vote has been taken on it.
239 xii. Rule 12: Ex-officio members as defined in the by-laws shall be permitted to make motions to amend.
240 xiii. Rule 13: Ex-officio members as defined in the bylaws shall also be permitted to sponsor resolutions,
241 without a voting SA member, if the content relates directly to their position.
242 xiv. Rule 14: By a $\frac{2}{3}$ vote of SA members present, Robert's Rules of Order can be suspended.
243 xv. Rule 15: Discussion can be closed by a 60% vote of SA members present.
244 xvi. Rule 16: All meeting attendees are expected to be respectful to other meeting attendees and to maintain
245 proper meeting decorum.

246 **Section 7: Outreach Guidelines & Member Responsibilities**

- 247 A. Rule 1: All voting representatives shall host at least one forum or outreach activity with individuals from their
248 respective constituencies and report all outcomes to the SA at the next regularly-scheduled meeting following
249 such an activity. The four undesignated at-large representatives shall plan at least one Cornell Caring
250 Community, Lift Your Spirits, or large-scale outreach event per semester.
251 B. Rule 2: All elected members must fulfill two assigned outreach requirements per two-week time frame. Such
252 events will be designated by the Vice President of External Affairs. If the member does not document their
253 outreach as specified by the VP of External Affairs, the member will be credited with one whole absence.
254 Any conflicts in schedules or other special circumstances as references in Section 1, Rule 6 of this document
255 must be brought to the attention of the VP of External Affairs.
256 C. Rule 3: All voting representatives may communicate regularly with their constituents through e-mail mailing
257 lists and listservs, which may be maintained by their respective college dean's office, the Department of
258 Campus Life, the Office of the Dean of Students, or the Office of the Assemblies.
259 D. Rule 4: Any Student Assembly member, including the Vice President for External Affairs, must submit a
260 mass message (e-mail, advertisement, press release, etc.) to the Executive Board for approval. The Executive
261 Board may approve a message by a majority vote and the vote may be conducted by email. The
262 correspondence must be saved.
263 E. Rule 5: The Vice President for External Affairs and the President will give final approval for the Student
264 Assembly newsletter. No amendments or additions to the newsletter will be distributed without the approval
265 of both officers.
266 F. Rule 6: The Executive Vice President must monitor and respond to any inquiries on the SA website. Such
267 inquiries can be forwarded to the appropriate Assembly member in order to ensure the most accurate
268 answers.

- 269 G. Rule 7: All ex-officio members acting in liaison positions should report relevant information to the Student
270 Assembly about their respective organization and report relevant actions of the assembly to their respective
271 organization as they see fit.

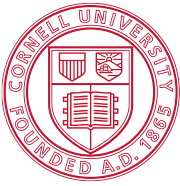
272 Section 8: Spending Guidelines

273 A. Category Spending:

- 274 i. Rule 1: In order for a disbursement of budgeted funds to be made, either the SA President or the Vice
275 President for Finance must approve it. The Vice President for Finance is responsible for classifying the
276 expenditure into a budget category.
277 ii. Rule 2: The Student Assembly budget must be reviewed and approved by the SA by the conclusion of
278 the second meeting of the academic year.
279 iii. Rule 3: Any reallocation of funds between categories of the budget or spending of the budget surplus
280 must be confirmed by a majority vote of the Appropriations Committee followed by a majority vote of
281 the Student Assembly, at large.
282 iv. Rule 4: The Vice President for Finance will maintain a record of all expenses of their committee. At the
283 end of each semester, he or she will make public the amount left in the committee's account.

284 B. Special Projects Funding:

- 285 i. Rule 5: The Student Assembly may choose to fund any project, program or service through SA Special
286 Projects that it deems to improve the quality of undergraduate student life or to further the goals of the
287 SA. Special Projects funding is a type of category spending.
288 ii. Rule 6: Special Projects funding may be requested by any of the following, but not limited to:
289 a. Any Cornell registered student organization
290 b. SA committee chairs that seek funding for expenditures that exceed their committee's budgeted
291 allocation
292 iii. Rule 7: The SA President and Vice President for Finance together may approve any special projects
293 funding request up to \$400 without consultation with the ~~Appropriations~~ Executive Committee.
294 Amounts up to \$400 may also be funded by a majority vote of the ~~Appropriations~~ Executive Committee.
295 Request must be made public at a Student Assembly meeting in the form of an "Announcement/Report"
296 before being approved. Any SA voting member can motion for the request to be sent to the
297 ~~Appropriations~~ Executive Committee if they feel necessary.
298 iv. Rule 8: The ~~Appropriations~~ Executive Committee shall decide upon special projects requests over \$400
299 and under \$1500 by a majority vote. The SA, at large, may reverse an ~~Appropriations~~ Executive
300 Committee decision to fund amounts over \$400 by a two-thirds vote. The request should be presented to
301 the Student Assembly in the form of a resolution.
302 v. Rule 9: Requests \$1500 and over shall be decided upon by a majority vote of the ~~Appropriations~~
303 Executive Committee and confirmed by a majority vote of the Student Assembly, at large. The SA, at
304 large, is only required to confirm requests of \$1500 or greater. The request should be presented to the
305 Student Assembly in the form of a resolution.
306 vi. Rule 10: The Vice President for Finance shall present a written or oral report to the SA at large, each time
307 a special projects disbursement is made.

6 Student Health Advisory Committee, and update the responsibilities of Officers

10 **Whereas**, Article X of the Student Assembly Bylaws state, "These bylaws may be amended at any
11 regular meeting of the assembly by a two-thirds vote of the members present, provided that
12 the amendment has been submitted in writing at the previous regular meeting. Amendments
13 may be presented to the assembly by voting members and by community petition with at
14 least 100 Cornell undergraduate student signatures;"

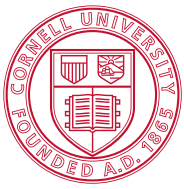

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4 **ARTICLE I: EX-OFFICIO MEMBERS**

5 **Section 1: Ex-officio Membership**

6 Ex-officio membership grants members of the Cornell community (student, alumni, faculty, staff, administrator, etc.)
7 full-debating privileges but not voting privileges. These positions are granted to community members to either
8 provide a perspective from another governing body or to enhance the overall operations of the Student Assembly.

9 **Section 2: Ex-Officio Executive Committee Positions**

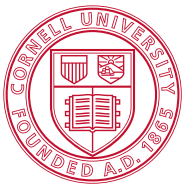
- 10 A. The SA can grant an ex-officio position to any member of the Cornell community to serve as the
11 Executive Archivist.
12 B. The SA can grant an ex-officio position to any member of the Cornell community to serve as the
13 Parliamentarian.
14 C. The SA can grant an ex-officio position to any member of the Cornell Community to serve as Director
15 of Elections.

16 **Section 3: Organizational Liaisons**

- 17 A. The SA shall grant one member chosen by the Greek Tri-Councils an ex-officio position as an
18 organizational liaison. The liaison chosen by the Tri-Councils shall be selected on a rotating basis from
19 the three councils, beginning with a representative of InterFraternity Council, following with Panhellenic
20 Association, and finishing with Multicultural Greek and Fraternal Council. Each liaison will serve for one
21 semester, and a liaison from the next council in the rotation will be granted membership at the beginning
22 of the following semester.
23 B. The SA will grant one executive member from Residential Student Congress an ex-officio position as an
24 organizational liaison.
25 C. The SA will grant one member from Cornell Undergraduate Veteran Association an ex-officio position as
26 an organizational liaison. This liaison must represent the interests of the United States and its allies.

27 **Section 4: Shared Governance Liaisons**

- 28 A. Student Trustees. The SA will grant the Student Trustees ex-officio positions as shared governance
29 liaisons for the duration of their terms.
30 B. Undergraduate University Assembly Members. The SA will grant both student-elected University
31 Assembly members ex-officio positions for the duration of their terms.

32 **ARTICLE II: OFFICERS**

33 **Section 1: Officers**

34 The officers of the SA shall be a President, an Executive Vice President, a Vice President of Internal Operations, a
35 Vice President for Finance, a Vice President of External Affairs, a Vice President of Diversity and Inclusion, a
36 Director of Elections, a Parliamentarian, and an Executive Archivist. These officers shall perform the duties
37 prescribed by this Charter and by the parliamentary authority adopted by the SA.

38 **Section 2: Election and Appointment of Officers, Time of Election/Appointment**

39 The SA will, as soon as possible after the spring election, hold an organizational and planning meeting in executive
40 session. At this meeting, the voting members will elect from among themselves the offices of Vice President of
41 Internal Operations, Vice President for Finance, a Vice President of External Affairs, a Vice President of Diversity
42 and Inclusion. At this meeting or a meeting soon after, the voting members will elect from the Cornell community
43 (student, employee, faculty, alumnus living in Ithaca) the office of Director of Elections. Self-nomination will be in
44 order in each of the elected offices. Elected officers should be approved by a majority vote of SA members present at
45 organizational meeting. Additionally, at this meeting or a meeting soon after the members will affirm the
46 appointments of Parliamentarian and Executive Archivist. The offices of Parliamentarian and Executive Archivist will
47 be appointed by the SA President. Each nominee for the respective offices shall be subject to majority approval of the
48 SA voting members. The newly elected officers will undertake the responsibilities of their position at the start of their
49 term on the SA. Elections for officers shall be by secret ballots. SA voting members may have one vote for each
50 position to be filled but may not vote for any one individual twice on any ballot.

51 **Section 3: Terms of office**

52 Officers shall serve for a term of one year or until their successor is elected and is administered the oath of office or
53 until the first of June of the year following the incumbent officer's election, whichever occurs first.

54 **Section 4: Recalling officers**

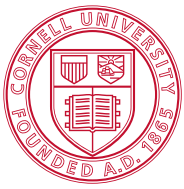
55 Two-thirds vote of the voting membership of the SA may vote to recall any officer of the SA from his or her office.

56 **ARTICLE III: OFFICER DUTIES**

57 **Section 1: President**

58 The responsibilities of the President are as follows:

- 59 1. Attend and chair all SA meetings.
- 60 2. Attend all Assemblies' leadership meetings and meetings with Executive staff.
- 61 3. Submit agenda items for leadership meetings after soliciting topics from Assembly members.
- 62 4. Serve as the primary Assembly correspondent with the administration, the media, and the student body.

- 63 5. Correspond with the University President following each Assembly meeting enumerating all actions that are
64 passed and are under the University President's purview and to solicit his or her response.
- 65 6. Correspond with the Deans of the College of Agriculture and Life Science; College of Architecture, Art, and
66 Planning; College of Arts and Sciences; College of Engineering; School of Hotel Administration; College of
67 Human Ecology; School of Industrial and Labor Relations, College of Business; following each Assembly
68 meeting enumerating all resolutions that are passed and under the purview of each individual college and
69 school and to solicit their responses.
- 70 7. Supervise all elected officers and ensure they are discharging their responsibilities.
- 71 8. Attend all open sessions of the Board of Trustees and the Board of Trustees Executive Committee held in
72 Ithaca and report back to the Assembly on said meetings.
- 73 9. Appoint Assembly Parliamentarian and Executive Archivist.
- 74 10. Write and present annual SA report by the end of the term.
- 75 11. Consult with the Director of Elections regarding elections' advertising as long as the President is not eligible
76 for reelection.

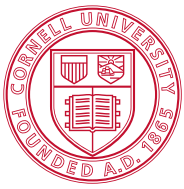
77 **Section 2: Executive Vice President**

78 The responsibilities of the Executive Vice President are as follows:

- 79 1. Attend all SA meetings and act as Chair in the absence of the President.
- 80 2. Chair the Executive Committee
- 81 3. Assume the office of President should a vacancy arise.
- 82 4. Serve as Assembly correspondent in the absence of or on behalf of the President.
- 83 5. Attend all Assemblies' leadership meetings and meetings with Executive Staff.
- 84 6. Submit agenda items for leadership meetings after soliciting topics from Assembly members and be
85 responsible for the creation of the weekly agenda for Assembly meetings.
- 86 7. Coordinate and assist the undergraduate student UA delegation.
- 87 8. Supervise and assist all ad-hoc committees.
- 88 9. Track actions of the Assembly to ensure final disposition and confirm correspondence with appropriate units
89 when Assembly actions impact them.
- 90 10. Help initiate and organize lobby efforts at both the state and federal levels.
- 91 11. Be responsible for responding to questions or comments made during Open Microphone. Issues can be
92 delegated to other members of the Assembly.
- 93 12. Be responsible for keeping contact with University Relations and reporting on a regular basis to the SA on
94 issues that concern the student body.
- 95 13. Oversee the Committees on Health and Wellness, Academic Affairs, the Environment, and Residential Life
96 by assisting and advising the committee chairs, attending meetings as necessary, and holding monthly
97 executive sessions with all committee chairs.
- 98 14. Plan fall retreat for committee chairs with the Vice President of Internal Operations.
- 99 15. Coordinate and supervise new member orientation with the Vice President of Internal Operations.

100 **Section 3: Vice President of Internal Operations**

101 The responsibilities of the Vice President of Internal Operations are as follows:

- 102 1. Attend all SA meetings and act as Chair in the absence of the President and Executive Vice President.
- 103 2. Assume the office of Executive Vice President should a vacancy arise.
- 104 3. Chair the SA when the Assembly is in executive session.
- 105 4. Chair the Executive Cabinet.
- 106 5. Monitor committee membership.
- 107 6. Coordinate and supervise all aspects of the SA cabinet in Willard Straight Hall.
- 108 7. Maintain and monitor SA attendance records and send warning notices to members who are in jeopardy of
- 109 violating the Assembly attendance policy.
- 110 8. Oversee all SA committees by assisting and advising the committee chairs, attending meetings as necessary,
- 111 and ensuring that any vacancies are filled.
- 112 9. Enforce committee attendance and outreach requirements for all voting SA members.
- 113 10. Coordinate and supervise new member orientation with the Executive Vice President.
- 114 11. Supervise SA Liaisons.
- 115 12. Maintain relations with intercollegiate student organizations of which the SA is a member — e.g. Ivy Council,
- 116 SUNY Student Assembly.
- 117 13. Plan fall retreat for committee chairs with the Executive Vice President.

118 **Section 4: Vice President for Finance**

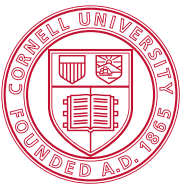
119 The responsibilities of the Vice President for Finance are as follows:

- 120 1. Serve as SA treasurer and report to the Assembly regarding Assembly balances in December and May.
- 121 2. Chair the Appropriations Committee.
- 122 3. Propose the Student Assembly's budget in the form of a resolution by one of the first two general assembly
- 123 meetings of each SA term.
- 124 4. Coordinate and chair meetings of Student Activity Fee recipients and draft proposal to SA regarding
- 125 establishing new fee, biannually.
- 126 5. Meet with GPSA members to discuss the Student Activity Fee Guidelines, which appear as Charter
- 127 appendices, at least once per semester.
- 128 6. Oversee the Financial Aid Review Committee and the Student Assembly Infrastructure Fund Commission by
- 129 assisting and advising the committee chairs and attending meetings as necessary.

130 **Section 5: Vice President of External Affairs**

131 The responsibilities of the Vice President of External Affairs are as follows:

- 132 1. Coordinate constituency representatives' community outreach efforts (including, but not limited to,
- 133 community forums, meetings with Deans, internal school governments, etc.);
- 134 2. Invite all relevant stakeholders to Student Assembly meetings, when the weekly agenda is released;
- 135 3. Devise mechanisms for student organizations to become active members in the decision making process of
- 136 the SA; most importantly, committees;
- 137 4. Oversee the City and Local Affairs Committee and the Technology Committee by assisting and advising the
- 138 committee chair and attending meetings as necessary;
- 139 5. Chair the Communications and Outreach Committee;

- 140 6. Consult with the Director of Elections regarding elections' advertising;
- 141 7. Arrange all advertising, postering, banners, social media, etc.;
- 142 8. Serve as a liaison to relevant news sources;
- 143 9. Serve as editor of SA newsletter to be sent over email to the entire undergraduate student body at least two
- 144 times/semester. The newsletter should include the current month's accomplishments and next month's plans,
- 145 accompanied by the name of a contact person to whom comments and questions may be addressed. Maintain
- 146 contact with Student Assembly alumni through distribution of the biannual Student Assembly newsletter to
- 147 any interested alumni;
- 148 10. Monitor and maintain all aspects of the Student Assembly website at <http://cornellsa.com>.

149 **Section 6: Vice President of Diversity and Inclusion**

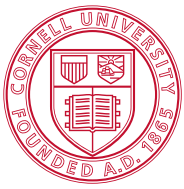
150 The responsibilities of the Vice President of Diversity and Inclusion are as follows:

- 151 1. Chair the Diversity and Inclusion Committee;
- 152 2. Serve as a direct link between the SA and the Office of Academic Diversity Initiatives, as well as the Center
- 153 for Intercultural Dialogue;
- 154 3. Undergo a diversity training session provided by Human Resources and/or OADI;
- 155 4. Prepare training sessions for the SA on addressing issues of diversity along with the Vice President of
- 156 External Affairs;
- 157 5. Meet at least monthly with the Associate Vice Provost (OADI) and the Associate Dean of Students/Director
- 158 of Intercultural Programs;
- 159 6. Meet on an as-needed basis with other administrators and staff concerning diversity initiatives;
- 160 7. Attend the Diversity Community meetings on a semesterly basis;
- 161 8. Maintain communication with the individual diversity councils of the colleges;
- 162 9. Ensure that legislative acts of the SA are culturally inclusive;
- 163 10. Provide updates on the state of diversity at Cornell and work to align the SA with University initiatives;
- 164 11. Work with University-sponsored programs such as the Pre-freshmen Summer Program and Diversity
- 165 Hosting Month to introduce new students to the governance system of Cornell;
- 166 12. Coordinate with the Vice President of External Affairs to effectively communicate with groups that advocate
- 167 for underrepresented students on campus.
- 168 1. Maintain communication with the Campus Planning Committee;
- 169 2. Provide updates on the state of infrastructure and sustainability at Cornell and work to align the SA with
- 170 University initiatives;
- 171 3. Provide the assembly updates on the status of the 2035 Carbon Neutrality Campus Initiative;
- 172 4. Coordinate with the Vice President of External Affairs to effectively communicate with groups the progress
- 173 of various infrastructural projects.

174 **Section 7: Director of Elections**

175 The responsibilities of the Director of Elections are as follows:

- 176 1. Chair the Elections Committee and report all the activities of said committee to the general SA;

- 177 2. Assume responsibility for all aspects of the Fall and Spring elections and coordinate all efforts with the
178 Director of the Office of the Assemblies, the VP of External Affairs, and the President;
179 3. Serve as SA correspondent for election matters;
180 4. Ensure that the Elections Committee is successfully completing the following tasks:
181 a. Making every effort to ensure the greatest number of candidates for each available position,
182 b. Ensuring all candidates are aware of and abiding by elections, campaigning, postering, and other
183 Assembly and University policies,
184 c. Coordinating and advertising an informal “Meet the Candidates Forum”,
185 d. Coordinating and advertising opportunities for candidates to make public appearances,
186 e. Coordinating and advertising public forums specifically for candidates to discuss any ballot referenda, if
187 such forums are deemed necessary by the Executive Board,
188 f. Contacting student organizations and informing them of the elections process and encouraging them to
189 send delegates to elections activities in order to report candidates’ stances on relevant issues to their
190 organizations,
191 g. Ensuring that candidates have submitted pictures and statements
192 h. Making every effort to achieve the highest possible voter turnout by advertising and assisting the Office
193 of the Assemblies in the coordination of elections days;
194 5. Make sure, in conjunction with the VP of External Operations, that there are a substantial number of
195 potential ballot referenda to be considered for approval by the SA, and that all approved referenda are
196 advertised along with all elections activities described in #5 above (especially c. and e.).

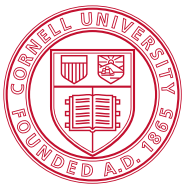
197 **Section 8: Parliamentarian**

198 The Parliamentarian need not be an SA member. The office of Parliamentarian holds no special voting privileges. The
199 Parliamentarian also may not hold the President or Executive Vice President positions. The responsibilities of the
200 Parliamentarian are as follows:

- 201 1. Advise the President and committee chairs on questions of parliamentary procedure;
202 2. Classify new actions brought before the SA into the categories specified in Article III, Section 2, Item A of
203 the SA Charter;
204 3. Upon a specific request by an SA voting member, the Parliamentarian shall give the Assembly his/her
205 recommendation on a parliamentary inquiry;
206 4. The Parliamentarian shall present a workshop on parliamentary procedure and this charter to the incoming
207 assembly, preferably before the end of the spring semester but no later than the fourth week of the fall
208 semester;
209 5. The Parliamentarian shall count a hand vote to discern simple majority from the gallery, where all eligible
210 voters sit in a designated area;
211 6. The Parliamentarian shall coordinate with the Office of Assemblies to ensure that the SA governing
212 documents are public and reflect the changes made by the SA.

213 **Section 9: Executive Archivist**

214 The Executive Archivist need not be an SA member. The office of Executive Archivist holds no special voting
215 privileges. The Executive Archivist also may not hold the President or Executive Vice President positions. The

216 Executive Archivist shall be responsible for verifying the novelty or precedence of any proposed action or legislation
217 with Assembly members, or others, bring before the Executive Board.

218 **Section 10: Offices of Officers**

219 The President, Executive Vice President, and Vice President of Internal Operations will each have independent
220 offices titled respectively: "The Office of the President, The Office of the Executive Vice President, The Office of the
221 Vice President of Internal Operations." Members of each office will aid their respective officer in the execution of any
222 requested tasks and duties. Members of each Office will be appointed by the respective officer's discretion and will
223 not require further Student Assembly approval. Members of each Office will be included in both the general Student
224 Assembly Listserv and the Executive Board Listserv.

225 **ARTICLE IV: MEETINGS**

226 **Section 1: Regular Meetings**

227 Regular meeting times and places will be publicly announced at least 72 hours-prior to the scheduled meeting date.

228 **Section 2: Special Meetings**

- 229 A. The President may convene special meetings of the SA to consider issues of immediate and pressing concern.
230 The President will also call a special meeting after being instructed to do so by six of the voting members of
231 the SA.
- 232 B. Conflicts- If there is a major conflict that affects a significant portion of the undergraduate student body,
233 such as a religious conflict, any member may direct the SA president to call a special meeting in lieu of the
234 regularly scheduled meeting. The request must be made 2 weeks in advance of the regularly scheduled
235 meeting at issue.

236 **Section 3: Organizational Meeting**

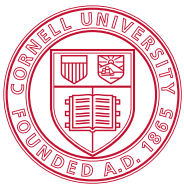
237 The first meeting of the academic year shall be known as the Organizational Meeting and shall be for the purpose of
238 adopting the schedule for regular meetings and approving the standing rules.

239 **Section 4: Informal meetings**

240 The SA shall hold an informal meeting as events warrant at the discretion of the Executive Board. This meeting will
241 be reserved for informal discussions between SA members and other interested parties, to set goals and priorities for
242 the upcoming weeks. No legislation can be decided upon during these informal sessions. The attendance policy will
243 remain in effect during the meeting.

244 **Section 5: Executive Session**

245 With the concurrence of two-thirds of the voting members in attendance, the SA or any of its committees may go into
246 executive session during a regularly scheduled meeting only to discuss confidential matters as defined by this Charter.

247 No policy determinations will be made in executive session. The Student Assembly may also hold executive sessions
248 for internal elections and planning purposes. Executive session shall be closed to non-voting, non-executive members
249 of the assembly. Community members may be invited by the assembly to participate in an executive session. Secret
250 ballot votes shall be reserved for executive sessions.

251 **Section 6: Quorum**

252 A quorum shall consist of a majority of the voting members of the SA.

253 **Section 7: Community Votes**

- 254 A. Should there only be one undergraduate ex-officio non-elected member in attendance, he or she will only be
255 allocated one vote.
- 256 B. The community clause may only be exercised on final votes of sense-of-body resolutions, which excludes (1)
257 funding and budgetary decisions, (2) amendments to the SA Charter and Standing Rules, (3) the ability to
258 make motions, (4) creation/dissolution of committees (5) selection of officers, committee members, and
259 liaisons from the popularly elected SA (i.e. allocation of the Student Activity Fee, approval of Parliamentarian,
260 Liaison to the Provost, etc.).
- 261 C. Prior to the final vote of a resolution, qualifying undergraduate members of the community will be permitted
262 to cast their vote. The President will announce to the Assembly the collective vote of the gallery and liaisons
263 prior to the casting of popularly elected members' votes on any given sense-of-the-body resolution. Both
264 community votes will be allocated to the side that has a simple majority.
- 265 D. Any member of the undergraduate student body can request, at the beginning of a meeting, that the current
266 status of all students wishing to participate in a community vote be validated. Each member of the
267 community must then present their Cornell IDs to the Parliamentarian, who will subsequently validate their
268 status as undergraduates via the Cornell website.

269 **Section 8: Regularly Scheduled Meetings for Purposes of the Student Assembly** 270 **Attendance Policy**

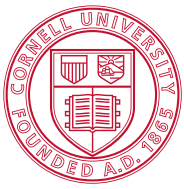
- 271 A. Attendance at all organizational and specially scheduled meetings is required, when the Executive Committee
272 provides SA members at least 72-hours prior notice of the meeting.
- 273 B. Any member who fails to attend a required meeting or event shall be considered absent. Any late arrival or
274 early departure from a required meeting will result in a half-absence. This includes Executive Sessions.

275 **ARTICLE V: EXECUTIVE BOARD**

276 **Section 1: Composition**

277 The Executive Board shall be composed of the officers of the SA. The Executive Archivist, the Director of Elections
278 and the Parliamentarian serve as non-voting members of the Executive Board.

279 **Section 2: Duties**

280 The Executive Board of the SA shall coordinate the actions of the SA to ensure its smooth operation, set the agenda
281 for the Regular Meetings of the SA and inform all relevant parties of Executive Cabinet decisions. Additionally, the
282 board shall send its minutes to all representatives within 24 hours of its meeting.

283 **Section 3: Meetings**

284 The Executive Board shall hold meetings at least once a week during the academic year. Special meetings of the Board
285 may be called by the Executive Vice President and shall be called upon the written request of four members of the
286 board.

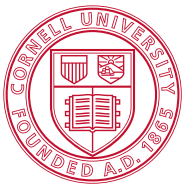
287 **ARTICLE VI: COMMITTEES**

288 **Section 1: Creation and Maintenance of Committees**

- 289 A. Committees will be established with the adoption of a committee charge to be included in these bylaws. A
290 committee's charge must be adopted and placed in these Bylaws before its bylaws are to be considered.
291 Committee bylaws shall be adopted with a majority vote.
- 292 B. Any member of any SA committee or commission (except for the Appropriations committee, Executive
293 Committee, and Elections committee) who will be an undergraduate for the entirety of the following SA term
294 and who requests to maintain their membership during the transition from one SA term to the next may do
295 so at the discretion of the committee's outgoing chair. The chair of the committee or commission will
296 transmit the names of any returning members or commissioners to both the outgoing and newly elected Vice
297 Presidents of Internal Operations by the last day of classes in May. The Vice President of Internal Operations
298 will ensure that all returning committee or commission members are staffed and included on the appropriate
299 listserv once the new SA term begins on June 1st and will inform each chair of any returning members or
300 commissioners.
- 301 C. For the purposes of communication and collaboration, the President and all Vice Presidents of the Student
302 Assembly will serve as ex-officio non-voting members of all Student Assembly committees and commissions
303 on which they do not serve as voting members. This policy does not apply to the Appropriations Committee,
304 Infrastructure Fund Commission, and Elections Committee.

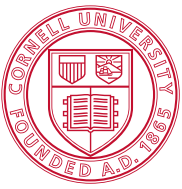
305 **Section 2: Review Committees**

- 306 D. Review Committees shall review all policies, programs, and actions and shall aid in the budget/program
307 planning process of sectors of the University that create policy directly affecting student life.
- 308 E. The Vice President for Student and Campus Life shall appoint a staff member to work with the chairperson
309 of certain review committee to assure proper functioning of the committee.
- 310 F. Undergraduate members of the review committees will be designated by the appropriate constituency bodies
311 and by application. All non-Student Assembly members will be subject to the approval of the SA.
- 312 G. Review committees will discuss program assessment/planning documents with the SA during the fall
313 semester as part of the committee's responsibility for the areas under their jurisdiction.
- 314 H. Review committees will be convened in the beginning of the fall semester by the VP Internal Operations.

- 315 I. Furthermore, the Student Assembly review committees reserve, can, and should exercise at their discretion
316 legislative authority over residential life policies of the University (i.e. the Department of Campus Life and the
317 Office of the Dean of Students). When exercising this authority, review committees are recommended to
318 consult the Residential Student Congress of Cornell.
- 319 J. **Committee on Dining Services** – The Committee on Dining Services will work to represent student
320 interests in the Cornell food system. The committee will consist of at least one faculty member, two Dining
321 student workers and/or Dining Student Sustainability Coordinators, two voting SA members, one
322 graduate/professional student, and at least ten additional students. The VP of Internal Operations for the
323 Student Assembly will recommend additional students to both the committee Chair and the Executive
324 Cabinet for their approval. Additionally, the Director of Dining (or a designee) and the Budget Director of
325 Dining shall serve ex-officio. The Chair, who does not have to be a SA member, will work with the Director
326 to select relevant administrators and staff to be present at meetings. Members will collectively review the
327 policies and initiatives of Dining Services, and make recommendations to Student Assembly and Dining
328 Services leadership for improving existing policies or integrating new ideas.
- 329 K. **Student Health Advisory Committee:** The committee will work in conjunction with Cornell Health to
330 examine healthcare policies improve student health, wellness, and safety, and act as a form of open
331 communication between student voices and Cornell Health administration. The committee will consist of a
332 Steering Committee, which is made up of a SA & GPSA co-chair, committee chairs(s) from each respective
333 sub-committee, a SHBAC liaison, an SDS liaison, and designated Cornell Health administration. The
334 recognized subcommittees of the student Health Advisory Committee are: Patient Care, Sexual Health and
335 Gender Services, Health and Wellness, Student Health Benefits, and the Mental Health Standing Committee.
336 The SA co-chair will be held by a member of the SA and the committee will be under the supervision of the
337 SA & GPSA co-chairs.
- 338 L. **Environmental Policy and Planning Commission** – The commission will research issues affecting the
339 campus and its surrounding area, as well as provide recommendations for reducing Cornell’s environmental
340 impact. The Environmental Policy and Planning Commission will be charged with creating new legislation
341 and enforcing past environmental legislation. This commission is also charged with providing environmental
342 education and outreach in order to better inform students and the campus community about the campus’s
343 environmental impact and sustainability issues. The Environmental Policy and Planning Commission will
344 work closely with students, administrators, student environmental organizations, the Cornell Sustainability
345 Office, the Campus Planning Committee, the Campus Infrastructure Committee, and the City and Town of
346 Ithaca Sustainability to better recognize and address the environmental concerns of the campus and its
347 community as well as to encourage collaboration in working toward the creation of a more sustainable
348 environment. The chair position can be held by any member of the Cornell undergraduate student population
349 and the committee will be under the supervision of the Executive Vice President.
- 350 M. **City and Local Affairs Committee** – This committee will advocate on behalf of students’ interest at the city
351 and county government levels. In addition to its advocacy work, the committee will organize events that
352 foster a sense of engagement in the Ithaca community for Cornell students. The chair position can be held
353 by any member of the Cornell undergraduate student population and the committee will be under the
354 supervision of the Vice President of External Operations.
- 355 N. **Academic Policy Committee** – The committee will advise the Student Assembly on all academic matters at
356 Cornell. Committee members will research, review, recommend, and develop projects to improve academic
357 life for the student body. This committee will work closely with the Dean of Students and the Faculty Senate
358 to ensure that students’ concerns related to academic policy are voiced effectively to university officials. The

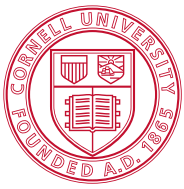

- 359 chair position can be held by any member of the Cornell undergraduate student population and the
360 committee will be under the supervision of Executive Vice President.
- 361 O. **Financial Aid Review Committee** – The committee will examine the financial aid policies of Cornell
362 University. It shall also be responsible for the administration of the Student Helping Students grant. The
363 committee shall consist of a chair, up to two SA members, between five and ten undergraduate students, at
364 least four-fifths of whom receive some form of institutionalized financial aid. The Associate Vice Provost for
365 Enrollment, the Directors of Financial Aid, the Associate Director of Financial Aid for Customer Service and
366 Community Relations, a counselor from the Office of Financial Aid, two faculty members, and the Vice
367 President for Student and Academic Services shall serve as ex-officio non-voting members. This committee
368 will be under the supervision of the Vice President for Finance.

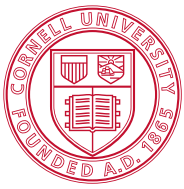
369 **Section 3: Operational Committees**

- 370 A. Operational Committees shall maintain the proper functioning of the internal organization of the SA, and
371 shall therefore facilitate the full expression of the SA's responsibilities to the Cornell student body.
- 372 B. Operational committees shall be convened in the beginning of the fall semester, or when the committee's
373 function prescribes, by the Committee on Committee Structure (or its successor body) in coordination with
374 interested SA voting members.
- 375 C. **Appropriations Committee** – The Appropriations Committee of the SA is the financial branch of the SA. It
376 reviews all requests for SA funding as well as the policies and guidelines regarding the Student Activity Fee
377 and those organizations, which receive funding from it. The Committee shall consist of 8 voting members of
378 the SA, to be selected by the Assembly at large during their organizational meetings; the VP Finance, who
379 shall serve as Chair; and 7 undergraduates at-large to be selected by the Executive Cabinet. The Director of
380 the Office of the Assemblies or their designee shall serve as an ex-officio non-voting member. No SAFC
381 Commissioners shall serve as voting members of the Committee. Quorum shall be defined as a simple
382 majority of all voting members. A designee of the chair shall take minutes at all meetings.
- 383 a. **Organizational Finance Review Committee** – The Financial Organization Review Committee
384 (FORC) operates as a subcommittee of the Appropriations Committee. The Committee will be
385 responsible for working with the Student Activities Finance Commission (SAFC) to review all
386 organizations receiving SAFC funding and all organizations that apply for first time SAFC funding.
387 The Committee will consist of 3 members of the SA Appropriations Committee and 2 SAFC
388 commissioners. FORC will meet regularly on an as needed basis but will hold at least one meeting
389 each Spring semester that will include a full audit of all existing SAFC funded organizations. FORC
390 will review new organizations applying for SAFC funding to determine (1) if there is an existing
391 SAFC funded organization that fulfills the new organization's purpose and mission, (2) if there is an
392 existing club that has identical or overlapping officers and/or advisor, and (3) whether the
393 organization needs funding from SAFC to function or can significantly benefit from access to SAFC
394 funding. FORC will audit organizations currently funded by SAFC to check (1) if any organizations
395 have identical or multiple overlapping officers and advisor, and (2) if there are any organizations that
396 receive funding from multiple Orgsync profiles but represent the same group. If an organization is
397 found to clearly fall into any of these categories, FORC can by majority vote declare that the
398 organization in question is no longer in good standing with SAFC, making the organization not
399 eligible for SAFC funding. Any FORC decisions can be appealed to the Appropriations Committee
400 and overruled by a majority vote of the Appropriations Committee.

- 401 D. **Student Assembly Infrastructure Fund Commission** – The SAIF Commission (SAIFC) of the SA is
402 responsible for evaluating applications for funding through the SAIF. The rules governing the operation of
403 the SAIFC are contained in Appendix C of the SA Charter. The Commission shall consist of at least 12 and
404 no more than 17 commissioners. The commissioners must include five voting members of the SA, consisting
405 of a Chair, who will be the Vice President of Infrastructure of the SA, three Assembly members elected
406 during the Assembly’s Spring organizational meetings, and one New Student voting member of the SA,
407 internally elected by the Assembly following the Fall election. The remaining commissioners will consist of at
408 least seven and no more than twelve undergraduate students who are either returning commissioners or are
409 selected from a pool of applicants and approved by the Executive Cabinet, with the exact number of
410 commissioners to be set at the discretion of the Chair of the Commission and the Staffing Committee of the
411 SA. No SAIFC Commissioners shall serve as voting members of the SAIFC (with the exception of the Vice
412 President for Finance). No more than 2 of the voting Student Assembly members on the SAIFC may also be
413 voting members of the Appropriations Committee and no more than 4 of the total voting members on the
414 committee may be voting members of the Appropriations Committee. Quorum shall be defined as a simple
415 majority of all staffed voting members. Upon request, a written summary of the meeting will be provided by
416 the chair. The Vice President for Finance and Vice President of External Affairs shall serve ex-officio as
417 non-voting members of the Commission. The Director of the Office of the Assemblies or their designee shall
418 serve as an ex-officio non-voting member.
- 419 E. **Communications and Outreach Committee** – The Communications and Outreach Committee helps to
420 bridge the disconnect between campus and the Student Assembly. The Assembly strives to foster
421 collaborative student activities, as well as inform the student body about the Student Assembly initiatives,
422 meetings, and resolutions. The committee will ensure a direct and ever present link between students active in
423 campus government, the administration, and students at-large and will relay student interest to the SA. The
424 committee will assist in furthering the outreach efforts of the assembly by aiding in the coordination of SA-
425 sponsored events including, but not limited to conducting polls, referenda, community outreach forums,
426 designated constituency events, and hearings. The committee will also assist in coordinating efforts and
427 devising strategies to involve more non-voting members in the decisions and events of the SA. The Assembly
428 plans recreational events for students. The SA Vice President of External Affairs will serve as Chair of the
429 Committee.
- 430 F. **Elections Committee** – The committee will coordinate and implement regularly scheduled and special
431 elections of the SA and directly elected undergraduate representatives to the UA. The SA Director of
432 Elections shall serve as chair with a vote only in the event of a tie. The committee consists of ten voting
433 members, of whom less than half may also be members of the SA. At one of the first two SA meetings of
434 each academic year, the Executive Cabinet will present a slate of proposed members to the SA for
435 confirmation, which the SA must approve or disapprove in its entirety. The Executive Cabinet may fill any
436 subsequent vacancies without confirmation by the SA. No person may be a candidate in an election
437 supervised by the committee in the same academic year when the person served as a voting member of the
438 committee. All committee meetings will be closed. Only voting members will be permitted to attend the
439 meetings unless specifically invited by the Director of Elections. This committee will be chaired by the
440 Director of Elections of the Student Assembly.
- 441 G. **Executive Cabinet** – The committee shall staff any vacant committee positions the Student Assembly (SA)
442 is empowered to staff during meetings in early fall. The committee shall re-evaluate the committee application
443 outreach plan at the end of every spring term. The committee shall also evaluate SA committees’ end of the
444 year report and determine if the SA committee and/or their composition need to be changed. The committee



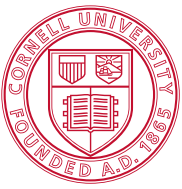

445 shall be charged with creating and enforcing an attendance policy for all committees. The membership of this
446 committee shall include the SA's President, Executive Vice President, Vice President for Finance, Vice
447 President of External Affairs, Vice President of Internal Operations, Vice President of Diversity and
448 Inclusion, and all SA committee chairs. Ex-officio membership shall be granted to the Director of the Office
449 of Assemblies. The VP Internal of Operations shall serve as chair. The VP of Internal Operations shall be
450 responsible for consulting with chairpersons of committees and recommending candidates for vacant
451 committee positions to the Executive Cabinet. The Executive Cabinet shall assume the duties and
452 responsibilities of the Student Assembly Staffing Committee, as referred to in other documents.

453 Section 4: Diversity

- 454 A. **Diversity and Inclusion Committee** – The committee shall serve as the body through which the SA, the
455 diversity councils of the undergraduate schools and colleges, the Office of Academic Diversity Initiatives
456 (OADI), and the Center for Intercultural Dialogue coordinate their efforts to promote awareness and
457 understanding of the increasing importance of diversity and create an environment that brings together
458 diverse perspectives and fosters diversity of thought. The charge of the Diversity and Inclusion committee
459 will be to:
- 460 a. To be a meeting grounds for interested students to meet members of the administration to
461 brainstorm, formulate and lead implementable policies in the field of diversity and inclusion.
 - 462 b. To review the efforts of the Diversity Committee and diversity councils of the colleges.
 - 463 c. To provide a brief report of its progress to be presented by the Vice President of Diversity &
464 Inclusion to the SA General Body by the final meeting in the fall semester, as well as a full report to
465 include (but not limited to) the goals of the academic year, the strategies devised for achievement of
466 these goals, the progress of UDC initiatives, college- specific initiatives, obstacles, and potential goals
467 for the next academic year to be presented in the same manner at the final meeting of the spring
468 semester.
 - 469 d. Composition
 - 470 i. The Diversity and Inclusion Committee will aim to be a collective voice of the diversity of
471 backgrounds, cultures, ethnicities, gender identities, races, religions, and sexual orientations
472 represented at Cornell.
 - 473 ii. Non-SA student representation: student members of the committee may be recruited from
474 institutions and organizations such as the diversity councils of the colleges, Women's
475 Resource Center, Center for Intercultural Dialogue, ALANA, Haven Executive board,
476 Cornell Outdoor Education, International Student Union and any member of the Cornell
477 student body who is interested in diversity initiatives.
 - 478 iii. Student Assembly representation: SA LGBT Liaison at-large, Women's representative,
479 International representative, both Minority Liaisons, First Generation Students
480 Representative, and the Vice President of External Affairs are required to be members of the
481 committee.
 - 482 iv. Administrative representation: this committee shall consist of at least one staff representative
483 from each of the diversity councils of the colleges; an OADI staff member; a staff
484 representative from the Mario Einaudi Center for International Studies and a staff
485 representative of the Center for Intercultural Dialogue. The committee is required to meet
486 its staff representatives at least once every month in the academic year.

- 487 e. Structure
488 i. The Vice President of Diversity and Inclusion of the Student Assembly will chair the
489 Diversity and Inclusion committee.

490 **ARTICLE VII: COMMUNITY RIGHTS AND CONFIDENTIALITY**

491 **Section 1: Community Rights**

492 The SA and its committees shall respect and protect the rights of individual members of the Cornell community. All
493 members of the community, who do not otherwise have an appointed or elected position on the student assembly,
494 have the right to add a resolution to the Student Assembly Agenda as a sponsor after gaining the approval of a
495 Student Assembly committee through a majority vote or after procuring the written signature of at least a majority of
496 seated SA members and presenting it to the SA President or their designee for verification at least 48 hours before the
497 meeting at which the resolution is to be introduced. Resolutions that appear on the agenda using either of these
498 methods may not have more than 3 sponsors who are not Student Assembly members of Student Assembly
499 committee chairs.

500 **Section 2: Confidentiality**

501 When a subject under discussion or examination requires the use of personal confidential information, all reasonable
502 efforts shall be made to safeguard the confidentiality of this information. Confidential information is meant to include
503 any and all information that, if publicly exposed, would endanger the privacy, safety, or security of any member of the
504 Cornell community (students, faculty, and staff), or constitute a breach of any individual right guaranteed by the
505 University, the State of New York, or the federal government.

506 **Section 3: Infringement of Confidentiality**

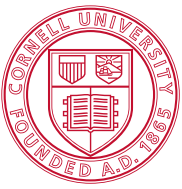
507 If any member or group of the University feels that any action of the SA or its committees is infringing upon that
508 person's or that group's rights under this Article, then that person or group may appeal to the Judicial Codes
509 Counselor (JCC) to determine whether probable grounds exist for a complaint. By majority vote, the SA may suspend
510 any actions related to an appeal to the JCC until the JCC makes a final ruling on the appeal.

511 **ARTICLE VIII: PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES**

512 **Section 1: Public Events and Campus Forums**

513 The SA shall conduct at least one public event or forum per semester at alternating locations on campus. These
514 public events or forums shall include administrators related to a particular topic of current student interest.

515 **ARTICLE IX: PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY**

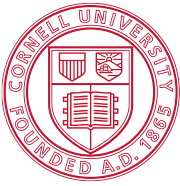

516 The rules contained in the current edition of Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the SA in all cases to
517 which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the Charter, Bylaws, Standing Rules, and any
518 special rules of order the SA may adopt.

519 **ARTICLE X: AMENDMENTS**

520 These bylaws may be amended at any regular meeting of the assembly by a two-thirds vote of the members present,
521 provided that the amendment has been submitted in writing at the previous regular meeting. Amendments may be
522 presented to the assembly by voting members and by community petition with at least 100 Cornell undergraduate
523 student signatures.

Whereas, the Student Assembly Vice President for Finance must propose an operating budget for the Student Assembly each academic year;

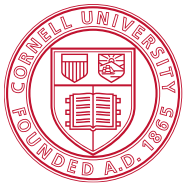
