6	ABSTRACT: This resolution urges Cornell University to publicly call on the Association of
7	Universities for Research in Astronomy (AURA) to denounce the construction of the Thirty Meter
8	Telescope (TMT) on Mauna Kea, Hawai'i, and divest all support for the TMT until such a time that
9	the construction of the TMT is moved to another location.

13	Whereas The Venetre Meet (Indiagnous meetle of Herveit) have lived on the Herveiten Islands
13	Whereas, The Kanaka Maoli (Indigenous people of Hawai'i) have lived on the Hawaiian Islands since time immemorial,

16	Whereas, United States troops invaded the Hawaiian Kingdom and forcefully deposed Queen
17	Lili'uokalani in violation of U.S. constitutional law and international law in 1893,

19	Whereas, In 1898, the United States allegedly annexed Hawai'i through an act of Congress known
20	as the Newlands Resolution and acted upon the pretension the measure had the legal force
21	of a treaty, which it did not,

24 25	1) on the occasion of the 100th anniversary of the illegal overthrow of the Kingdom of
26	Hawai'i on January 17, 1893, acknowledges the historical significance of this event which
27	resulted in the suppression of the inherent sovereignty of the Native Hawaiian people;
28	reconced in the coppression of the innerent coveresging of the fitting framework,
29	(2) recognizes and commends efforts of reconciliation initiated by the State of Hawaii and
30	the United Church of Christ with Native Hawaiians;

32	(3) apologizes to Native Hawaiians on behalf of the people of the United States for the
33	overthrow of the Kingdom of Hawaii' on January 17, 1893 with the participation of agents
34	and citizens of the United States, and the deprivation of the rights of Native Hawaiians to

38	Kingdom of Hawai'i in order to provide a proper foundation for reconciliation between the

44	Whereas, the Association of Universities for Research in Astronomy (AURA) was founded in 195
45	by a group of U.S. universities to create astronomical observation facilities that would be
46	available for research purposes by qualified institutions,
47	
48 49	Whereas, AURA is now made up of 47 U.S. member institutions, including Cornell University,
50	Whereas, the TMT Observatory Corporation was founded in 2003, for the purpose of carrying ou
51	the TMT construction project,
52	the Thir constitution project,
53	Whereas, on July 1, 2009 the TMT Board of Directors selected Mauna Kea on the Island of
54	Hawai'i as the site for the TMT,
55	mawar ras the site for the rivir,
56	Whereas, the mountain of Mauna Kea is a landscape of cultural and spiritual importance to the
57	Native Hawaiian peoples and is designated as a conservation district under the Department
58	of Land and Natural Resources,
59	of Land and Ivatoral Resources,
60	Whereas, the University of Hawai'i signed a 65-year General Lease from the Board of Land and
61	Natural Resources (BLNR) in 1968,
62	Tractal Resources (BLI VIV) III 1700,
63	Whereas, BLNR can terminate the Lease if the lease terms—including caring for Mauna Kea—are
64	not met,

66	Whereas, thirteen observatories currently exist on Mauna Kea,
67	
68 69	Whereas, the University of Hawai'i has mismanaged Mauna Kea for over fifty years, during which:
70	(1) In 1995, a helicopter had to airlift trash from the summit at a cost of \$20,000,
71	(1) III 1993, a hencopter had to affilt trash from the summit at a cost of \$20,000,
72	(2) In 1998, The Hawai'i State Auditor released a report documenting 40 years of
73	mismanagement of Mauna Kea by both the BLNR and the University of Hawai'i,
74	inisinanagement of Mauna ixea by both the blavic and the oniversity of Hawari,
75	(3) In 2004, subpoenaed documents reveal that spills of sewage, ethylene glycol, diesel fuel,
76	and toxic mercury had taken place on Mauna Kea,
77	and toxic increary had taken place on iviatina ixea,
78	(4) In 2005, an environmental study by NASA concluded that astronomy activity on Mauna
79	Kea had caused "significant, substantial, and adverse harm,"
80	isea mad cadoca organicand, odostantial, and adverse manni,
81	(5) University of Hawai'i's 2010 Comprehensive Management Plan includes a
82	Decommissioning Plan for removing observatories and restoring the sites, yet no
83	decommissioning plans have been finalized,
84	(6) In 2011, The Subaru Observatory spilled 100 liters of orange coolant and is shut down
85	for two weeks

87 Whereas, in 2014 AURA, and Cornell University, joined the TMT International Observatory's 88 governing board, 89 90 Whereas, in 2015 Hawai's State Governor David Ige temporarily halted construction due to public 91 pressure and admits, "We have in many ways failed the mountain. Whether you see it from a 92 cultural perspective or from a natural resource perspective, we have not done right by a very 93 special place," 94 95 Whereas, on October 30, 2018 the Hawaii Supreme Court by majority decision issued its opinion 96 affirming the Hawaii Board of Land and Natural Resources' decision to issue a Conservation 97 District Use Permit (CDUP) for construction of the TMT on Mauna Kea. 98 99 Whereas, on June 20, 2019 The Hawai'i Department of Land & Natural Resources issued a notice 100 to proceed to the University of Hawai'i to proceed with construction of the TMT on Mauna 101 Kea, 102 103 Whereas, on July 15, 2019 thousands of Native Hawaiian protectors peacefully blocked the Mauna 104 Kea Access Road with kūpuna (elders) of the community making up the front line, 105 106 Whereas, on July 17, 2019 33 kūpuna and five kia'i (protectors) were arrested by police. Some were 107 in wheelchairs, 108 109 Whereas, thousands of Native Hawaiian protectors have since gathered to peacefully block the 110 Mauna Kea Access Road since July 15, 2019 in order to stop construction of the TMT and 111 continue to do so today, 112 113 Be it further resolved, that the degradation of Mauna Kea in any way, shape, or form, without the 114 consent of Native Hawaiians, including those actively obstructing the Mauna Kea Access 115 Road in non-violent protest, represents a genocidal act against the Indigenous people of 116 Hawai'i and their culture, sovereignty, and spiritual practices, 117 118 Be it further resolved, that Cornell University is a member of AURA, and through this 119 membership, a benefactor and supporter of the construction of the TMT on Mauna Kea, 120 121 Be it further resolved, Cornell University is therefore a supporter and benefactor of the 122 degradation of the culture, sovereignty, and spiritual practices of the Native Hawaiian 123 people, 124 125 Be it further resolved, that any refusal on behalf of Cornell University to call on AURA to rescind 126 its support and contributions to construction of the TMT on Mauna Kea would be another 127 failure on behalf of Cornell University to prioritize the rights of Indigenous peoples over 128 research practices dependent on the unethical exercise of physical violence through 129 militarized police force,



130	<b>Be it finally resolved,</b> that Cornell University will respect the rights of the Native Hawaiian people,
131	their rights to non-violent protest, and demand that AURA divest from, and cease all
132	support for, the construction of the TMT on Mauna Kea, until such a time that the TMT
133	project is moved to another location.
