Affirming Cornell's Stance on Supporting the Rights of Transgender Individuals

ABSTRACT: This resolution seeks to affirm Cornell's support of Transgender Individuals

Sponsored by: Matthew Indimine '18

Whereas, on February 22, 2017, the Department of Justice and the Department of Education withdrew the statements of policy and guidance reflected in:

- a. letter to Emily Prince from James A. Ferg-Cadima, Acting Deputy Assistant Secretary for Policy, Office for Civil Rights at the Department of Education dated January 7, 2015, and
- b. Dear Colleague Letter on Transgender Students jointly issued by the Civil Rights Division of the Department of Justice and the Department of Education dated May 13, 2016;

Whereas, in doing this, the Trump Administration has revoked federal guidelines specifying that transgender students have the right to use public school restrooms that match their gender identity;

Whereas, Cornell University was founded as an institution where "any person can find instruction in any study;"

Whereas, Cornell University's official non-discrimination policy includes the protection of "sex, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression;"

Whereas, according to the University's May 2016 Restroom/Facilities Guidelines, the University allows students, faculty, staff, and visitors to use the restroom or facility that corresponds to their gender identity;

Whereas, gender identity refers to an individual's internal sense of gender, and may be different from or the same as the person's sex assigned at birth;

Be it further resolved, that the students are Cornell University will have the ability to use the restroom or facility that corresponds to their gender identity,

Be it further resolved, that Cornell University publicly condemn the Trump Administration's revocation of federal guidelines specifying that transgender students have the right to use public school restrooms that match their gender identity;

Be it further resolved, that the Student Assembly reaffirms the importance of reporting bias incidents by all members of the community;

Be it finally resolved, that Cornell University reaffirm its commitment to supporting people of all gender identities,

Dear Members of the Cornell LGBTQ+ Community,

On February 22nd, the White House and Departments of Education and Justice withdrew the federal guidance on transgender students that was issued in May 2016. This was historic guidance for the nation's schools on the needs and rights of hundreds of thousands of students who are transgender. The guidance summarized over a decade of best practices from across the country, advising schools that under the federal Title IX law, schools should treat trans students according to their gender identity. This guidance allowed students throughout our nation to use restrooms matching their gender identity, as well as expected schools to honor one's gender identity in areas related to instruction, inclusive of names and pronouns.

A complete list of frequently asked questions and answers is available from the <u>National Center</u> <u>for Transgender Equality</u>, which provides both background and explanation for what is happening.

As a reminder for us at Cornell and in New York State, New York State <u>Human Rights Law (by means of regulation)</u> covers gender identity as a protected class. Governor Cuomo has also issued statements today related to <u>New York State protections and trans rights</u>. Cornell has <u>polices in place which protect our communities</u> from harassment and discrimination related to gender identity, and these policies reinforce this for all members of our community - students, faculty, and staff.

However, even with the law and polices in place throughout our state and in our local community, the climate for our transgender community is still deeply impacted by the ongoing federal and state actions regarding the rights of transgender people. Now is the time to reach out and provide support, to check in with those who you know, and to be sensitive to what you can do to create an inclusive, welcoming and supportive campus for our transgender and gender queer communities. There are still systemic and social barriers that impact our students, faculty, and staff every day.

All of us working together can continue to improve the climate for our community. As we continue to advocate for change, take time to imagine how you might be able to improve the Cornell and Ithaca experience for our transgender community. We have much work yet to do and this work is our collective work!

S.A. Resolution #31 Audit of Cornell University Administration Finances

ABSTRACT: A formal request for information from the University for Financial Data regarding the University Administration, specifically its resource allocations and general data on wages and salaries of it higher level staff.

Sponsored by: Mitch McBride '17, Diana Li '17

- Whereas, Article III, Section 6 of the Student Assembly Charter states, "The SA may request and obtain specific information from the President of the University regarding any subject which it deems of general student concern. If such a request is made, and said information is not furnished, the University President will report to the SA the reasons why said information cannot be furnished within two regularly scheduled SA meetings following the denial of the request. The SA will not request information falling into the following categories: salary or wage records of specific individuals, academic or financial records of specific individuals, medical or categorical (race, sex, age, etc) records of specific individuals and information otherwise defined as confidential or restricted by law."
- Whereas, Paul Campos, a law professor at the University of Colorado, Boulder, and a contributor to the New York Times, brought the attention of the public to the fact that "a major factor driving increasing costs [in tuition] is the constant expansion of university administration." (New York Times),
- **Whereas,** "According to the Department of Education data, administrative positions at colleges and universities grew by 60 percent between 1993 and 2009, which Bloomberg reported was 10 times the rate of growth of tenured faculty positions." (New York Times)
- Whereas, there is reasonable suspicion that the increased cost of education across the US may well be due to increases in administration sizes and salaries (and thus we need Cornell data),
- **Whereas,** the students of Cornell University deserve the right to know what they pay for as they are the consumers, customers, and contributors,
- **Whereas**, the Student Assembly expressly does not request any information of specific individuals within the University or information otherwise deemed confidential for privacy or legal concerns,
- **Whereas**, there are concerns that the administration has grown too large, has given too high of salaries to its higher level staff, and is too unwilling to disperse with redundant or ineffective employees,
- **Whereas**, the University must save money from administration expenses in order to dedicate itself to more (not less) generous financial aid policies in order to fulfill its mission of "any person, any study"
